Board Endorses New Ministry Proposal

The board has discussed this proposal at length, both with Doug and Michael in attendance, and in executive session, without them. We have looked at the budget, the pros and cons, and, especially, the opportunities.

- We honor Doug's plan to transition carefully into retirement, and to help GNH in this transition.
- We have a great opportunity here to be part of the pastoral and spiritual formation of a young and eager minister
- We think of this as a win-win proposal: everyone gets something out of it, and we are NOT saddled with an obligation to hire Michael at the end of a time of discernment; on the other hand, we have the opportunity to be part of his development and to fine-tune the arrangement all along the way.
- We are forward thinking: this is an innovative solution to a situation we will be facing within a few years. Churches everywhere are needing to think outside their traditional frameworks; this could even offer a model for other churches in the future.
- We want this to succeed we hope you will agree with us as you vote on December 8.

This proposal is to be voted by the congregation at its Annual Meeting to be held on December 8, 2019.

Rev. Doug, beginning no later than June 1, 2020, shall assume a new part-time work schedule of 25 hours per week. He will speak on two successive Sundays a month and be in residence in Cincinnati between those two Sundays. He will assume a new title as "**Senior Minister**" while retaining overall responsibility for day-to-day operations of GNH.

Michael Tacy, beginning immediately when Rev. Doug assumes a part-time work schedule, shall become "**Associate Minister**" and work as a Minister / Music Director approximately 30 hours per week. He will speak two successive Sundays per month. He will begin his on-the-job training as a Minister. Rev. Doug and Michael Tacy will operate under this arrangement for a <u>trial period of one year</u>. They, the Board, and the congregation will then determine if it should continue.

Three Goals:

1. Rev. Doug transitions into retirement for the next few years.

2. Michael Tacy equips himself, through on-the-job training, mentoring by others, and some Seminary level training, to be a Minister.

3. The Gathering at Northern Hills uses this opportunity to determine if Michael Tacy should succeed Rev. Doug as Senior Minister. **The congregation is under no obligation to eventually hire Michael as Senior Minister.** It will, however, join in the on-the-job training of Michael as a way to **possibly** find a Minister successor it knows, likes and respects.

How the New Ministry Arrangement Will Work:

- 1. Rev. Doug works half-time approximately 25 hours a week.
- 2. Rev. Doug continues to oversee all aspects of GNH Ministry.
- 3. Rev. Doug works with and mentors Michael in his role as a Minister.
- 4. Rev. Doug speaks two Sundays a month.
- Rev. Doug continues, as he has over the past five years, being available either in person, by phone, or by e-mail for all important matters. In congregation emergencies, or when requested for a funeral, he will be available in person.
- 5. Rev. Doug will be paid 60% of the salary he would otherwise earn as a full-time Minister to GNH.

- 1. Michael Tacy works half-time approximately 30 hours a week.
- 2. Michael Tacy serves as Associate Minister and handles Ministry responsibilities under the direction of the Board and Rev. Doug.
- 3. Michael Tacy speaks two Sundays a month.
- 4. Michael Tacy continues his work as Music Director.
- 5. Michael Tacy will be available in person, by phone, or by email for all important church matters.
- 6. Michael Tacy will undertake efforts on his own to learn the functions and expectations of being a Minister - through self-directed reading and learning, some Seminary class work, and on-the-job training.
- Michael Tacy will be paid 40% of Rev. Doug's salary plus his salary as Music Director.

There will be numerous other day-to-day functions of Rev. Doug and Michael Tacy that will be worked out by them, by the Board, and by input from members. If at any time this Ministry arrangement is not working well for the GNH congregation, new plans and arrangements will be made.

This proposal is to be voted by the congregation at its Annual Meeting to be held on December 8, 2019. The Board of Trustees shall determine, based on GNH bylaws, the vote threshold needed to approve the proposal.

The Nobel Prize for Economics Book Review By Ann McCracken



The Nobel Prize for Economics was awarded this year to Esther Duflo, the second woman and the youngest to ever receive the prize, Abhijit Banerjee, and Michael Kremer. Duflo and Banerjee are the authors of *Poor Economics; A Radical Rethinking of the Way to Fight Global Poverty*. Much of the work is centered on India and Africa. The book is available online, free at *upscsuccess.com* and anything with such a title is surely a read for UU's given our seven principles.

The authors quote Amartya Sen that "poverty leads to an intolerable waste of talent. Poverty is not just a lack of money; it is not having the capability to realize one's full potential as a human being."

The authors Duflo and Banerjee posit,

If we resist the kind of formulaic thinking that reduces every problem to the same set of general principles; if we listen to poor people themselves and force ourselves to understand the logic of choices; if we subject every idea to rigorous testing then we can construct a

- The poor often lack critical pieces of information and believe things that are not true.
- Studies say tell people something they don't know in an attractive and simple way, from a credible source. It must say something people don't already know.

(Governments pay a huge cost in credibility when they say things that are misleading, confusing or false.)

- The poor have responsibility for too many aspects of their lives. The richer you are the more right decisions are made for you e.g. clean piped water, automatic saving methods, while the poorer you are the less you believe that small cost today will impact the distant future resulting in procrastination. Therefore, make it as easy as possible to do the right thing using the power of default and small nudges.
- There are good reasons that some markets are missing the poor, or that the poor face unfavorable prices in them.(e.g. interest rate on loans, catastrophic health policies.)
- Poor countries are not doomed to failure because they are poor, or because they have had an unfortunate history. Failures of programs for the poor are most likely due to some <u>avoidable</u> flaw in the design of policies in respect to the ubiquitous I's: **Ignorance, Ideology, Inertia.** The authors suggest from studies that inviting everyone to meetings, holding government workers accountable for failures in their performance, monitoring politicians in performing their duties and sharing this information with voters, and making clear to users of servicers what they should expect from services they are entitled to.
- Expectations about what people are able or unable to do all too often end up turning into self-fulfilling prophecies. Those whom no one expects to perform have no incentive to perform. On the other hand, success often feeds on itself. When a situation starts to improve, the improvement itself affects beliefs and behavior.

GNH Emergency Procedures

On Sunday, Sept 15, Rev. Doug and Board President Sue Cline outlined procedures for the congregation to take in the rare event of the below emergencies. Please read these carefully...

- <u>Fire Emergency:</u> Pull Fire Alarm (Alarms located in Sanctuary, Front Lobby, Original Lobby, Quimby Room, Conference Room). Respond to alarm by evacuating building at nearest exit. Meet children and others in rear play area.
 - <u>Tornado Warning Siren</u>: Move to lower level hallway, closet, utility room, nursery restroom. Second best option: hallway and restrooms outside the church office. AVOID rooms with windows.
- <u>Active Shooter</u>: Remember Flee, Hide, Fight. Respond to Air Horn signal that there is a dangerous and threatening person in the building. Call 911.
- First option: **Flee** out nearest door or broken window (use hammer to break window near tech station). Run away from building.
- Second option: Hide in Minister's office (door near tech station is usually unlocked during services. Lock it once inside.) Hide in classrooms, closets, etc.
 - Last option: Fight back throw chairs, etc. at perpetrator.
- Experts and Police advise <u>not</u> to try and talk to or negotiate with an active shooter.

Security Preventive Measures Implemented

- All outside entry / exit doors to remain locked at all times.
- Greeter opening of front entry doors on Sunday mornings.
- Upcoming installation of keypad entry system next to front doors. All members will be given the keypad code to enter front doors. Members of renting groups will be a given unique code.
- Doors will remain always locked.
- Changing of locks and limited key access to all other entry doors.
- Installation of locks on RE classroom doors.
- Sanctuary entry doors to be closed and locked during services. Usher will open door for latecomers.
- If you see anything suspicious, report to Minister, a Board member, Michael Tacy, Greeter, or Usher.
- Be especially aware when in building during non-Sunday meetings and events. Doors must be kept locked. Know who is attending a service or a meeting by introducing yourself to new visitors.
- All firearms are forbidden in the building. Signs posted. (recommended by police).
- New parking lot LED light fixture for nighttime.
- No Trespassing Signs around parking lot (recommended by police).
- Possible video surveillance cameras for front outside entry area.
