

Notes from Your Board

Absentee Voting Considered

GNH Bylaws require that members be present at congregational meetings in order to vote.¹ This requirement has proved problematic at several recent meetings. At two meetings the congregation voted for the temporary suspension of this mandate, and members unable to be present were eligible to vote by absentee ballot. At the most recent meeting, it was determined not to follow the practice of suspending our organization's Bylaws. The correct response is to change the Bylaw.

At its February 2 meeting, Board members considered several different ways of amending this Bylaw. A special Congregational Meeting will be held on Sunday, April 19 solely for the purpose of addressing this Bylaw change. Under our current Bylaws, a quorum of 40% is required and 75% of members present must affirm the proposal; all voters must be present. If a proposal to approve some form of voting even when absent is approved, that provision will go into effect immediately and be applicable for the Mid-year Congregational Meeting scheduled for June 7.

An information meeting to discuss options for the Bylaw revision will be held in the coming weeks. We urge you to attend and to make your thoughts known.

Also at the recent board meeting, board liaisons were named to several GNH committees and team. The purpose of the liaison is to provide a means of direct communication between the teams and the board and to facilitate board support of team mission and activities. In the coming month, liaisons will be contacting the chair of teams to gather information and to listen.

Thoughts From Rev. Doug



Most Unitarian Universalists are well-informed and intellectually curious. But UU's also want more than just information. Like anyone, we want to be inspired and moved to take action within ourselves and in society at large.

My messages are often full of information and research I've gathered. I hope, as well, that they touch the heart in some

way. Indeed, we can all read a non-fiction book or listen to a lecture on almost any subject. What we remember from a book, lecture or Sunday message, however, is not so much what we learned but what we felt. As a Minister who regularly speaks on Sunday mornings, that's not an easy task to achieve, but its one I take seriously - to inform and to inspire.

My three January messages used the theme of, "Lesser Known Inspirational Facts About Martin Luther King, Jr." They are examples of what I try to accomplish on Sunday mornings. I may not always be successful but I hope there are at least a few nuggets of information or ideas that are worth remembering.

During this month, my messages have a similar intention to enlighten and inspire. Their theme is, "Diversity Love Stories". My message this past Sunday looked at a beautiful black love story told in the book <u>An American Marriage</u> by Tayari Jones. It's won many awards and was featured in Oprah Winfrey's Book Club. I recommend the book to you. And you might read or listen to my message on our website.

This Sunday, I look at the love story of a same sex couple. And next Sunday I'll look at love stories of other-abled persons. My intent is not just to let you know about the lives of diverse people, but to instead examine ideas and lessons from their stories that are relevant to anyone. Indeed, we know that in this world filled with diverse cultures and people, we are nevertheless all much the same. We each have unique qualities but we all share many of the same feelings and emotions - like love.

I hope you not only celebrate a happy Valentine's Day on February 14th, but that you take the time to ponder what love means in your life. Additionally, I hope you might have reflected on the legacy of Dr. King during the month of January when we celebrated his national holiday. Again, I encourage you to read or listen to those messages if you did not hear them before.

I hope GNH's Sunday services, and my messages, help each of us to both learn and be inspired to change ourselves and the world!

Those attending the 2019 Annual Meeting in December selected one of two color schemes, the panels were ordered, and this past Saturday they went up!

Doug all who climbed ladders, measured carefully, drilled holes in the walls, and saved the congregation approximately \$700 in labor costs to put up the panels.

GNH Emergency Procedures Be Vigilant and Aware!

On Sunday, Sept 15, Rev. Doug and Board President Sue Cline outlined procedures for the congregation to take in the rare event of the below emergencies. Please read these carefully...

- <u>Fire Emergency:</u> Pull Fire Alarm (Alarms located in Sanctuary, Front Lobby, Original Lobby, Quimby Room, Conference Room). Respond to alarm by evacuating building at nearest exit. Meet children and others in rear play area.
 - <u>Tornado Warning Siren</u>: Move to lower level hallway, closet, utility room, nursery restroom. Second best option: hallway and restrooms outside the church office. AVOID rooms with windows.
- <u>Active Shooter</u>: Remember Flee, Hide, Fight. Respond to Air Horn signal that there is a dangerous and threatening person in the building. Call 911.
- First option: **Flee** out nearest door or broken window (use hammer to break window near tech station). Run away from building.
- Second option: Hide in Minister's office (door near tech station is usually unlocked during services. Lock it once inside.) Hide in classrooms, closets, etc.
 - Last option: Fight back throw chairs, etc. at perpetrator.
- Experts and Police advise <u>not</u> to try and talk to or negotiate with an active shooter.

Security Preventive Measures Implemented

- All outside entry / exit doors to remain locked at all times.
- Greeter opening of front entry doors on Sunday mornings.
- Upcoming installation of keypad entry system next to front doors. All members will be given the keypad code to enter front doors. Members of renting groups will be a given unique code.
- Doors will remain always locked.
- Changing of locks and limited key access to all other entry doors.
- Installation of locks on RE classroom doors.
- Sanctuary entry doors to be closed and locked during services. Usher will open door for latecomers.
- If you see anything suspicious, report to Minister, a Board member, Michael Tacy, Greeter, or Usher.
- Be especially aware when in building during non-Sunday meetings and events. Doors must be kept locked. Know who is attending a service or a meeting by introducing yourself to new visitors.
- All firearms are forbidden in the building. Signs posted. (recommended by police).
- New parking lot LED light fixture for nighttime.
- No Trespassing Signs around parking lot (recommended by police).
- Possible video surveillance cameras for front outside entry area.
